ZU Visit, Mendo World Cup Highlight 1994 Mendocino Workshop

Mendocino Music & Dance Workshop is long over but many memories of camp times remain for the over 200 adults

and children who attended the eight day session. The weather was wonderful, with clear sunny days and cool nights perfect for dancing, and for the first time in three years there were no problems with water shortages. Lots of prep work by the Woodlands crew, including laying wood chips around the dance and dining halls, helped cut back on the perennial dust problem, creating a more pleasant environment. Camp ran smoothly thanks to the hard work of the onsite staff of Lisa DeRensis, Nancy Leeper, and Rachel MacFarlane.

One major addition to the workshop this year was the first west coast appearance of New York's Zlatne Uste brass band. Many in attendance had never danced to live brass band music before and ZU opened the evening parties with a terrific, high energy set. A subgroup of the band stayed on the rest of the week, and contributed frequently to the kafana scene (ably run this year by kafanameister Laine Harris).

American folk influences made themselves felt a few times during the week. There was a cajun set at the kafana one night led by Lisa Leung that got everyone hopping, and Lache Cercel's Romanian set later in the week took off for the bayou a few times, to everyone's delight. Jim Garrett turned a bitov set into a clogging extravaganza that Petur transformed into a Bulgaro-American line dance.

EEFC was fortunate to have not one but two Bulgarian singers at Mendo this year. Pepa Koutcheva

and Tatiana Sarbinska impressed all with their singing, teaching and graciousness. The Saturday night party led by them was so highly anticipated that people turned it into a cabaret, listening raptly to these two wonderful performers.

A one-time-only event that marked this camp was the "Mendo World Cup." A simple bet was turned into a festival, complete with cheerleaders (dressed for the occasion), a referee, bands, and half-time entertainment with refreshments. It's hard to convey just how much fun this was. While Petur, Christos, Atilla, Josko, Mike, and Michael were battling it out on the field with surprising intensity, zurlas attacked gajda players, cheerleader incursions were repelled by mass onslaughts, and the brass band could barely play from laughing. It was a real village happening and capped off a great camp.


You can help!
